

# SECOND WILDLIFE FORUM

Sustainable Use for Conservation and Livelihoods

21 November 2018 | CBD COP-14, Sharm El-Sheikh, Egypt



The second Wildlife Forum will feature a series of multidisciplinary discussions on key issues, challenges, and opportunities on sustainable use of wildlife across geographical regions. It is an initiative of the [Collaborative Partnership on Sustainable Wildlife Management](#) (CPW), a voluntary partnership of 14 international organizations with substantive mandates and programmes to promote sustainable use and conservation of wildlife.

The purpose of the forum is to stimulate debate to advance policy dialogues and define priorities on sustainable wildlife management for the post-2020 period, including with an increased participation of Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities. It will build on the [first Wildlife Forum](#) held on 9 September 2015, in Durban, South Africa, in conjunction with the XIV World Forestry Congress.
